Positive results in these endeavors will generate new pathways for sustainable agriculture. The share of food in the household budget has dropped, we are much more numerous and the rapid productivity gains of the agricultural sector have benefited consumers, our agribusiness, supermarket distribution, upstream agriculture machinery, inputs ... and lastly to farmers whose incomes have stabilized in relative shares in GDP. The WTO Agriculture Agreement provides a framework for the long-term reform while this trend is most dramatically apparent in developing countries, it is also a feature of wealthier countries .
